PREPARING AMERICA FOR THE 2024 ELECTION

According to the Pew Charitable Trust, 61 percent of Americans say that talking about politics with people they disagree with is stressful and frustrating. This dismaying experience of political discourse contributes to what Pew characterized as the public's "unrelentingly negative" view of American politics last year.

Now we face the 2024 Presidential Election season, which may become the most polarizing political contest in living memory. Again.

While polarization may be a natural tendency, it is not inevitable. The cycle can be stopped, and we have an effective and flexible approach to stop it. **Thanks to donors like you, we're able to make these tools available for free.** Our new election resources have already made their way into hundreds of classrooms, campuses, religious spaces, and kitchens, empowering people to transform the way their community navigates the differences that matter most.

Polarization happens precisely because the differences matter. We can't rely on common ground to heal divisions. There are genuine, meaningful differences of perspective on critical issues like healthcare access, public safety, and economic opportunity. We don't all agree on policies and values—butand that is the fundamental power of a free, diverse, democratic society.

Decades of research and experience all tell us that polarizing forces—media narratives, social media, political campaigns, and human tendencies—can be overcome by the powerful experience of community. When people feel they belong, when they have authentic relationships with people from the "other side," when they have built trust and understanding across irreconcilable differences, then they cannot be inspired to fear, belittle, or dehumanize others.

Our new suite of election resources have already made their way into hundreds of classrooms, campuses, religious spaces, and kitchens, empowering everyday people to transform the way their community navigates the differences that matter most.

Community is not just our focus—it is the way out of this spiral of polarization.

By engaging in open dialogue with the people they live, work, worship, and learn with, the folks who put our guides to use become the single most powerful force against polarization that we have. They build the bonds of community that can effectively stop cycles of polarization.

As ever, the dialogues in this guide are designed to help people reach new mutual understanding and authentic connections with those around them—not to arrive at a new position on the topic. We do not ask people to stop advocating passionately for what they believe is right.

So many leaders called us in crisis, and thanks to donors like you, we have been able to answer their calls. We continue to support universities and nonprofits, interfaith alliances and government bodies, educators and community leaders through the difficult urgency of this moment. HIDDEN BRAIN ON EP'S LANDMARK ABORTION DIALOGUES

Peter Coleman, Professor of Psychology and Education at Columbia University, recently spoke on the popular podcast

and radio show Hidden Brain to talk about the challenge of polarization. Coleman and host Shankar Vedantam talked in depth about the "extraordinary story" of EP's landmark dialogues between pro-life and pro-choice leaders, holding it up as a model for what effective interventions to combat polarization might look like—and what's needed for them to actually work.

One thing that strikes me about the example you gave about these women in Boston," reflected Vedantam, "is that they really approached their conversations almost like a bomb disposal squad. They didn't wander in blithely and say, Okay, there's a bunch of wires here, let's figure out, maybe we should cut this one, let's see how it turns out. They actually sat down and very carefully took apart what they were doing, they took their time, they weren't in the public eye, they were doing this in private. I think when it comes to conflict resolution, a lot of us imagine that we can just simply show up with a pair of clippers and sort of clip a wire to disarm a bomb and that's gonna be it. We are underestimating how complex and how difficult the challenge actually is.
